“NOT SLOW BUT PATIENT”

OPENING

Ice Breaker - 5 minutes

Choose one:

- When have you waited a long time for something important, only to realize later that the waiting served a purpose?
- When you think about Christ's return, does it feel more encouraging, confusing, or distant?

One of the great questions Christians have asked throughout history is: "If Jesus promised to return, why has it taken so long?" Peter addresses that question directly.

Read the Text Together: 2 Peter 3:8-13

Read 2 Peter 3:8-13 aloud. Listen for: Why Christ's return seems delayed, what Peter says about God's patience, how believers should live while waiting

SUMMARY

Peter reminds believers that God's perspective on time is very different from ours. What feels like delay to us is not slowness to Him. God is not hesitating, forgetting, or failing to keep His promise. He is being patient.

Nick emphasized that God's patience is deeply personal. Christ has not returned yet because God is still gathering people to Himself. His patience is an expression of mercy, giving sinners opportunity to repent and believe.

Yet God's patience will not last forever. The Day of the Lord will come unexpectedly, and everything will be exposed before Him. Because of this, Peter shifts the focus from speculation about the future to a question about character: "What sort of people ought you to be?" (v. 11)

Believers are called to live holy, God-centered lives as they eagerly await the new heavens and new earth where righteousness dwells.

DISCUSSION

Observation Questions

- According to verse 8, how does God's perspective on time differ from ours?
- What reason does Peter give for Christ's apparent delay in verse 9?
- How does Peter describe the coming Day of the Lord in verse 10?
- What question does Peter ask in verse 11?
- What are believers waiting for according to verse 13?



This document can be used for either personal or group reflection.

Group facilitator: Please feel empowered to use only the questions that are helpful for the context of your group.

Interpretation & Theological Reflection

- Why is it important to distinguish between God's patience and God's slowness?
- What does God's patience reveal about His character? What does his judgment reveal about his character?
- What does Peter mean when he asks, "What sort of people ought you to be?" How does a future hope shape our lives here and now?
- How do we speed the coming of the Day of the Lord (v. 12)?
- Some believe the creation will be destroyed and reestablished; others believe God will redeem, purify, and restore creation. In either case, what will be different about the new heavens and the new earth? How does God's promise shape our view of the future?

Application Questions

- How does knowing that God's patience made room for your salvation affect the way you view His timing?
- How does God's character – his patience and his holiness – lead you to praise Him?
- Are there areas where you are becoming impatient with God? Why? What is it you long for in God's final redemption? How can God use that longing productively?
- If Christ returned unexpectedly this week, what would you want to be different about the way you're living?
- What would it look like to live as someone who truly reflects the coming kingdom of righteousness?

Closing Prayer

- Praise God for His patience, mercy, and faithfulness.
- Thank Him for keeping every promise He has made.
- Confess impatience with God's timing.
- Confess areas where your life is focused more on this world than God's kingdom.
- Thank God for His patience that led you to repentance.
- Thank Him for the hope of Christ's return and the new creation.
- Ask God to help you live with greater hope and expectation.
- Pray for holiness and faithfulness while you wait.
- Ask God to help friends and family who do not yet know Christ come to repentance.

Optional Take-Home Reflection

- Peter asks, "What sort of people ought you to be?" What is one specific way you can live this week that shows you belong to Christ's coming kingdom?
